- Frame rate

Video Resolution



Video Resolution



Video Frame Rate

24fps

- Standard for almost all movies
- More cinematic
- Less realistic

30fps


- Used on TV, particularly sports
- Slightly less cinematic
- More realistic

60fps

- Used in video games, slow motion videos
- Much less cinematic
- Most realistic

fps = frames per second

Available for: Windows, Mac

Pros:

- No paid version, all features are available for free
- Contains all features needed for a basic video project

Cons:

- Not as many features as more advanced video editors
- Video and audio can be difficult to distinguish in the timeline

Pros:

- No paid version, all features are available for free
- Contains all features needed for a basic video project

Cons:

- Not as many features as more advanced video editors
- Some tasks can take some time to figure out

Pros:

- Very accessible and easy to add video filmed with phone
- Has numerous features to enhance videos

Limits to free version:

 Includes watermark in final export

WeVideo



Pros:

- Runs in a browser, so it can be used on Chromebooks
- Includes free version

Limits to free version:

- Limited to five minute exports per month
- Can only store up to 1GB of assets
- Max export resolution is 480

Media Composer First



Pros:

- Most professional of all free editor software
- Contains

 numerous
 features and few
 limitations in free
 version
- Commercial version is the dominant video editor software used in film and TV

Cons:

- Takes awhile to install
- Requires free account
- Steep learning curve
- Minimum of four video tracks and eight audio tracks
- Strict system requirements
